

Not too easy, not too hard

Differentiation is one of the most important and difficult to implement elements of teaching. With a differentiated approach each child is given learning experiences which are matched to their current level of achievement. The ultimate goal may be similar across the class group, but different access points are provided for each achievement level. This approach is often supported by using flexible grouping of students. A pre-assessment places students into a particular group based on their achievement level. If they progress well, they will move into the next group. When this is done effectively students are constantly working in their 'Zone Of Proximal Development' (ZPD). The ZPD is a sweet spot where the learning is not too hard or too easy. In this zone students learn confidently and efficiently. It takes a lot of careful planning and ongoing adjustment to make this happen. We acknowledge our teachers for committing to this approach and making a difference every day.







Maths Olympiad

Compass Is Coming

We are transitioning to Compass software in the next two weeks. This transition will require parents to download a new App which will replace SkoolBag and other software. Compass will be used for student reports, communication, interview scheduling, roll marking, absence notification, event permissions and much more. Toys and Trading Cards

Curriculum & Instruction

Conceptual English Approach

After the successful transition to a Conceptual English approach to planning English lessons in K-2, we have commenced with this method across the school. This approach to teaching English runs in parallel with our already well-established reading, spelling and phonics programs of study.

Over the past couple of terms, teachers have received training from Dr Lorraine Beveridge from the *Primary English Teachers Association Australia* to support stage teams in planning for and delivering high impact English lessons that focus on quality literature. This enables students to deconstruct texts to identify what good writers do and to emulate this in their own writing.

Across the school we are using the new English syllabus that aligns closely with this approach. In term 1, all stage teams have been focusing on the concepts on Characterisation and Narrative, as well as ensuring plenty of explicit instruction time is dedicated to the learning of syntax and transcription skills such as sentence-level grammar, punctuation, word-level language, and vocabulary.

This shift in focus continues to be supported by our P&C who have generously funded class sets of texts being studied in classrooms across K-6. We thank them for their support of this initiative as the positive impact is easily observable across the school.







Type 1 diabetes is the fastest growing chronic disease in Australian children. There are over 140,000 Australians with type 1 diabetes. With approximately six new cases every day, Australia has one of the highest rates in the world. The number of Australian children being diagnosed with this disease is increasing by 6% every year.

Statistics <u>suggest</u> that in our small RLPS catchment zone there could be 30 children and young adults (aged 0-19) living with type 1 diabetes. Type 1 diabetes requires lifelong management. Technology (including continuous glucose monitors and insulin pumps) is available to assist in the management of type 1 diabetes but it can be expensive. If not managed well it can be debilitating or worse, fatal.

The <u>Danii Meads-Barlow Foundation</u> is dedicated to supporting type 1 diabetics and their carers to access lifesaving technology and education. The website needs to be updated following recent government funding for CGM technology, we are now providing scholarships for insulin pump technology (valued at approximately \$10,000) rather than CGM.

The Jelly Bean Ball is the largest fundraising event for the Danii Foundation. The night includes a 3 course meal, drinks, live entertainment, silent and live auctions. I seek your support for the Jelly Bean Ball this year, please consider buying tickets to attend on the night and/or whether you are able to donate auction items.

Composite Classes

As you are aware our classes are organised into stage groups. This means students are matched with students from different year groups in all classes except for Kindergarten. Syllabus documents sequence learning in stages and each stage includes the year group described in the table below:


Stage	Year Group
Early Stage One	Kindergarten
Stage 1	Year 1 and year 2
Stage 2	Year 3 and Year 4
Stage 3	Year 5 and Year 6

Concern is sometimes expressed regarding composite class arrangements due to the perception that students will be given instruction which is not matched to their age or school year. There is also a belief that students have been graded academically and placed in classes based on academic achievement. The reality is students at RLPS are placed in classes to ensure each class has a healthy balance of achievement levels and student needs and personalities.

Effective teaching is about addressing the needs of students through ongoing (formative) assessment. Teachers use the year group as the starting point and move quickly into teaching students in groups at the level they are currently achieving for each aspect of the curriculum. The level they are taught at may be below or beyond their school year. This is a more effective approach than restricting students to the curriculum attached to their school year.

For example it is very common for a Year 4 student to be achieving (or capable of achieving) at a Year 5 level. Similarly a Year 4 student may struggle doing Year 4 learning and be more suited to mastering Year 3 curriculum in some areas before moving in to Year 4 content. Restricting learning to only Year 4 content would not result in learning growth in both cases because the learning is either too easy or too hard.

Put simply, good teaching places students in their Zone of Proximal Development (see diagram below) throughout the day using formative assessment and differentiated teaching. When this aspect of teaching is understood it is easy to see that the composite classes pose no threat to student outcomes as teachers are encouraged to teach the students in front of them rather than blindly teaching them as a year group. It takes great skill and commitment over time to successfully implement formative assessment and ensure each student is learning as much as they can for each minute of each day. The complexity required to teach two year groups is virtually identical to the complexity of teaching one year group. Given this good educators do not pay much attention to composite class structures and are instead obsessed with knowing their students, their achievement levels and what each of them needs to learn next.



There is also a perception that composite classes might place students in groups with other students who are more or less socially developed. The advice relating to academic achievement also applies here as all students mature at different rates and have different levels of social competency. On average older children are likely to be more socially capable but this is not a given for each individual. Again it comes down to the teacher and how they value, teach and model social-emotional skills. A well led classroom allows students who are not as socially developed to grow through the observation of the behaviours that are modelled to them by older students. This is generally a one way street as older students are much less likely to regress and be influenced by the social and emotional skills of younger peers.

In practical terms composite classes are also used to ensure classes are balanced in number and student characteristics. For example we have 32 Year 2 students. We could put 25 students into a straight Year 2 class which would leave 7 students to go into a 1-2 class or a 2-3 class. This would most likely mean some students might feel singled out for being one of only 3 boys or girls of their year in that class. Similarly if we have 46 Year 3 students. We could have two classes of 23 however this is lower than the mandated quota meaning we would need to have larger classes elsewhere in the school such as a straight Year 4 class of 30. This would not be a fair arrangement and it is also not ideal for future enrolments. If a new Year 4 student enrolled we would only have the option of placing them in the Year 4 class taking it to 31. Under current arrangements we would have the choice of placing in them one of the three 3-4 classes taking into account the balance of numbers and student characteristics of those classes.

Our teachers engage in professional learning and programming in stage teams. As each teacher has the same composition in each stage teachers are able to plan together ensuring consistently quality and collective input for learning programs. Teachers are able to work to their strengths and use the strengths of the team around them. Most schools in Sydney have stage/composite classes to varying degrees and there is no research to suggest this disadvantages students. We have them across the school for the reasons described above.
