

Parent Visitor Check In

All parents who attend school and remain on site during school hours are required to check in. This is an Education Department requirement and not a COVID safety measure. If you are picking your child up during school hours there is no need to complete the check in. Please note however it is preferred that you contact the office and advise in advance if you or a representative is picking up a student early. Student Safety at Pick Up Time


Each week we get reports about unsafe parking and driving behaviour during pick up time. We all have a responsibility to make sure our actions prioritise student safety over convenience. This means parking legally and avoiding double parking, parking at intersections, parking across driveways and parking on the kerb. Brent Street and Barnstaple Road are wide and offer plenty of parking a short walk from the school. If possible please use these streets. We have had a couple of near misses and it is of great concern to our community that these risks persist. The RLPS School Band has reconvened and are working hard at rehearsals every Wednesday afternoon. We have some events planned and look forward to seeing them perform later in the year.






Managing Anaphylaxis

This week we initiated new eating arrangements at lunchtime. Instead of eating in the playground students eat inside in shared spaces and classrooms. This allows us to be more observant of what students are eating and how much they are eating. It also ensures lunchboxes are not lost in the playground and rubbish is less likely to be discarded inappropriately. Teachers can also observe and monitor students who are at risk of anaphylaxis. All staff are trained in how to identify and respond to anaphylaxis and each learning area has an accessible EpiPen. Given the serious implications of an anaphylactic episode we require parents to ensure they do not pack common allergens in lunch boxes. These include all nuts and nut products, fish and eggs. Please support our students by choosing other options and explaining to your child that they should never share food.

It is estimated that up to 400,000 (2%) Australians, including 1 in 20 children suffer from food allergies and some of these will experience a life-threatening, allergic reaction called anaphylaxis.

Uniforms and Lost Property

Our school has many uniform options for students and these options have been based on extensive consultation via the uniform committee. Examples of these options are provided on the following pages. Please note there is no hierarchy from the available options and full school uniform does not imply girls are required to wear the RLPS dress. Sport uniforms are not considered full school uniform and should be worn on sport days to ensure students are comfortable and appropriately covers for activities like gymnastics. We understand it can be hard to make sure a clean uniform is available every day and will never criticise your child about the uniform they have been provided with. Please ensure all uniforms are labelled as we have a large amount of unnamed lost property accumulate each month.

We are very grateful one of our parents Jamie, has generously offered to complete a review of lost property each month. She will sort and return items to classes and then clean and prepare any unnamed items in good/clean condition for a second hand stall. It is likely these items will be made available as the weather gets cooler in preparation for winter.

Excursion Payments

When excursions are organised fees are allocated and distributed equally based on the number of students in a class/year. If a student is scheduled to attend and then cannot attend for some reason their booking still has to be paid for. Without this provision the school incurs these costs . Unless advance notice of exceptional circumstances is given, these fees must be paid regardless of attendance. If your family is experiencing financial difficulty school support is available. Curriculum & Instruction

Phonics

Phonics is the main way in which children at Russell Lea Public School are taught to read in their earliest years. It is a method for learning reading and spelling through the decoding of the alphabetic language. Phonics, taught in a structured way, is generally accepted to be the most effective way to teach reading and spelling. Being able to decode words is a word recognition strand of reading. Learners are taught reading and spelling, using an explicit, systematic phonics lesson, daily throughout the week. Each session follows a structured and progressive format. These take the form of explicit teacher led sessions that are complimented with individual practice using games and activities. Teachers assess student understanding throughout each session and routinely assess knowledge of graphemes and the application of this knowledge in reading and spelling, to see whether the learner is ready to move on to the next phase of their learning.

In 2021, K-2 teachers took part in a considerable amount of Professional Development to improve their understanding of phonics and their capacity to enhance student outcomes through their teaching and assessing. As a result of this, RLPS have achieved results that are significantly higher than the state average in both the 2021 and 2022 mandated Year 1 Phonics Screening Check. The Department of Education recently released an update of the 2022 phonics results across the state. The below table outlines how our school results compared in the latest assessment.


