Curriculum & Instruction

Vocabulary Instruction

The new English syllabus for K-10 requires all students to develop a greater understanding of how to effectively use vocabulary of different tiers in spoken and written text to increase the precision of, and reader engagement in, their writing.

The syllabus distinguishes between three tiers of vocabulary:

Tier 1 refers to basic words that are common in spoken language. These are learned by children through everyday conversation without the need for explicit teaching.

Tier 2 refers to words that occur more often in mature language situations and in written text. Examples include *iconic, masterpiece, wealth, benefit, amiable*. These types of words are explicitly taught to support reading comprehension and increased descriptive writing.

Tier 3 refers to words that occur in specific domains. Students learn these words as the specific need arises. For example, the word *photosynthesis* in science, *onomatopoeia* in literacy, *percentage* in mathematics.

At Russell Lea Public School, teachers are being supported by Miss Dolan (APC&I) to plan and deliver explicit Tier 2 vocabulary lessons during Conceptual English sessions. Teachers are using quality texts to introduce students to new vocabulary, before completing activities that develop knowledge of word nuance and encourage use of the new words in their own texts. This is supported by The Department of Education's *Vocabulary in Context* guides.



National School Reform Agreement

You may be aware that the Australian Government has established an Expert Panel to inform the next National School Reform Agreement. This week the Expert Panel is releasing a survey to get the views of teachers, parents and students. This is all about ensuring those directly involved in the education system get a say in how we make it better and fairer. Survey participants will be able to have their say on range of issues including:

Improving education outcomes
Supporting student mental health and wellbeing, and
Attracting and retaining teachers.

The Expert Panel, led by Dr Lisa O'Brien AM, will report to Education Ministers at the end of October on the practical reforms that should be tied to funding in the next National School Reform Agreement.

The survey is available to complete here and will be open until Friday, 23 June 2023.

ARCO

RLPS has an Anti-Racism Contact Officer (ARCO). The role of the ARCO depends on the school context but generally they provide advice on anti-racism in schools. They assist teachers to access resources which build awareness and understanding of the impacts of racism and promote upstander responses to incidents of racism for staff and students. With staff they address complaints of racism involving students through approaches such as restorative practice which promote respectful behaviours. They work with the principal to formulate responses to racism and can manage complaints of racism made by students against other students. Learning about anti-racism is embedded in school curriculum and students are given age appropriate information which helps them develop the confidence to respond to any racist events at or beyond school.

COVID Procedures

Each week we continue to receive reports of positive COVID cases amongst students. If you child has COVID please advise the school and keep your child at home until they are symptom free. Students do not need to stay at home if they are symptom free. RAT kits are still available from the office if you need them

Ethics classes at Russell Lea Public School

Dear Parents and Carers.

Could you or someone you know be an ethics teacher or ethics coordinator for our school.

We are seeking volunteers so that we can provide ethics classes for all the families who have requested it for their children. We currently have a vacancy for a Year 3 ethics teacher and new teachers are needed each year. We are also seeking a new coordinator.

Volunteers can be parents, grandparents, other relatives, members of the community etc.

Full training is provided by Primary Ethics, the not-for-profit organisation approved to design curriculum and training for the ethics program. Training for ethics teachers consists of a two day workshop (or four 2.5 hour Zoom sessions) and short online modules. The ethics coordinator training is one 3 hour Zoom session. Lesson materials are provided. Suitable volunteers have an interest in children's education and development of critical thinking skills and teachers must be available on Tuesday, 9.00–9.30am each week. The coordinator does not need to available at any specific time.

In ethics classes, children learn how to think logically, disagree respectfully and support their arguments with evidence, rather than act according to blind habit or peer pressure.

Children discuss topics such as:

- -imagining how others feel
- -how do we treat living things?
- -what is laziness?
- -how do we disagree in a respectful way?
- -fairness
